During her life, she played organ at the McCutchanville United Methodist Church and worked as a secretary for various businesses in Evansville. She enjoyed playing piano, singing, fishing and camping. She also was an accomplished needle crafter.

Mrs. Sosbe Hart was born Oct. 27, 1921, in McCutchanville to the late Henry Jason and Laura Helen (Swope) McCutchan. She graduated from F.J. Reitz H.S. in Evansville, and attended Lockyear Business College.

### **AFTER 125 YEARS**

McJohnston chapel still stands strong

Over the years, the McJohnston Chapel of the McCutchanville Community Church has gone through renovations and additions. Church members laid the first brick of the building on April 12, 1880, and Sunday, members will celebrate the chapel's 125th anniversary.

Paul Swope and his wife, Marilyn Sue, of Evansville, were married in the chapel in August, 1950, and their reception was the first in one of the chapel's building additions, called the "'50s building."

"I remember it wasn't completely done," Swope said as he looked around the room. "It was bare concrete floor."

Swope's family has been attending the church for years, back at least to his great-great grandfather.

Today, he still remembers where his class met for Sunday school and singing in the choir as a child.

"There's a lot of old history here," he said. "It's pretty awe-inspiring that we've been able to preserve it that long. When you think back that you're one in a long history, it's kind of humbling."

McJohnston Chapel was made possible by Amelia McJohnston Atcheson and her sister, Wilhelmina McJohnston Moffett. Atcheson died in 1878, and in her will she left \$500 to be used to build a new church. Moffett then matched the sum, which started the movement to build what now stands as McJohnston Chapel.

Construction took just more than seven months. In December 1880, the first marriage was held in the chapel. Frances Gabatus McJohnston married William Erskine, uniting descendants of two pioneer families.

In September 1941, the church members decided to renovate the building. Some of the "wants" were new art-glass windows, new pews, complete redecoration of the walls and woodwork, a new furnace and flue, a pipe organ and more parking. The cost was estimated at \$4,500 to \$5,000. Everything was installed except new windows. It was discovered that the original windows were rare etched glass imported from France, and couldn't be duplicated. Many of them are still in the chapel today.

The chapel's most recent renovations were completed this year, including new carpeting and restrooms.

When the congregation outgrew the chapel over the past few years, the church decided to build a new sanctuary, which was completed early this year. The new building, formally dedicated in May, is on Petersburg Road across the street from the chapel, which is now used for special events and weddings. The church also changed its name in January 2002, when McCutchanville United Methodist Church and St. James United Methodist Church merged. The church maintains ties with the United Methodist Church, even though "Methodist" isn't in its official name now.

McCutchanville Community Church Pastor Robert Vester said the congregation hopes the church will exist for another 125 years, and invites the community to come and celebrate the first 125 years with the congregation Sunday.

"It's still in good shape," he said of the chapel. "I think of the long line of pastors who stood in that pulpit. That's a lot of sermons preached. It's neat to be part of that continuing story."

### **JUDY & NEIL SUMMERED IN YELLOWSTONE**



This past summer Judy & I work at Yellowstone National Park. We started the season this year. We started at Tower May 18<sup>th</sup> and finished July 31st. This was the third season

we have worked in the park. Judy was cashier once again and I was 1st cook at the employee dining room.

It was an enjoyable year even though I worked some 12 hour days early in the season. The kitchen is supposed to have three cooks to cover days off. We started the season with only two cooks. My third cook was a young man that had some sickness problems and no experience. This added some extra time for me every week until the middle of June when a third cook arrived. She was an experienced cook both in the park and as a vocation at a college in Minnesota. My day would normally begin at 5:30 with me making breakfast for 20 or so people. Then right after breakfast the noon meal would have to be started. There were two sitting for noon and evening meals. Noon meals varied from New England Broil to Turkey to Spaghetti. While some meals had frozen entrees most required us to fix them by 'hand.'

Judy's day at the store would start about 10 and continue for 7 to 8 hours. She enjoyed working there and meeting new customers each day. The pass just south of Tower was closed cutting us off from Canyon. This meant that the people that came to the store had to drive back around north to either that entrance or continue around the western drive to the other sites. Many tourists could not understand why the road was closed and some would come past about ten signs saying they couldn't get south of Tower because of road closure.

We were fortunate to get to see a variety of wildlife. Of course there are plenty of bison around most everywhere with elk coming in a close second as far as ability to see them. Deer were a bit more elusive this year. We did have a 'family' that came around the dormitory but we didn't see the young fawns this year.



Bears were active around the Tower area again this year. A mom and cub would wander around the dorm and store most of the spring. The picture is of cub after being treed by mom. The tree was across a stream near the dorm and a number of tourists and us had gathered to look at them. A large owl came around and 'attacked' them and mom decided it was best to have young one in the tree. One of the days a lone black bear decided to visit the outside of the store and was seen walking around it and looking in the windows. Later in the season Judy & I visited one of the valleys where wolves had brought down a bison. They, bear and coyotes were eating on the carcass. I had bought a spotting scope and we were able to see the female grizzly along with her two cubs. A way back we watched a wolf wandering around trying to get enough courage to contest the grizzly for the meat.

Since we had the scope we also went wolf watching at a couple of other places. Near Mt. Washburn we watched a female grizzly and one cub walk down around. It was cute as the cub would lag behind mom. It'd stand up and find out where she was and would hurriedly catch up with her. All of a sudden we noticed another grizzly approaching them. It would have been a male. We were worried that there would be a confrontation ending with the cub being killed. But it didn't happen. That day we saw those bears, some wolf, and elk all were around the mountain area.



At the beginning of the season we also watched moose near the store. Judy was always looking out for other moose because she felt this one was so scrawny after the winter. Yes, we eventually did see several moose around the park. As we were driving out of the park on August 1st we took a drive down to Petrified Tree where we had often seen moose. As we were getting discouraged because once again we didn't see any we glimpsed a female with a calf running up the mountain. Judy was quite happy to have a good end to our stay in the park.



Our other news is that Allen was called to active duty in April this year. He along with 1,500 FLANG (Florida Army National Guard) were activated for duty in Afghanistan. They trained at Camp Shelby (near Hattisburg, MS) for three months before going over. He left the states July 7th and will return next year about the same time. He started his duty there on patrols of the area. That was particularly hard on his feet. There is not much fighting in the area where they are. Lately he has been escort for people going to and from the Kabul area to their base, Blackhorse, east of Kabul. He has taken several courses to help get his AA degree. Their quarters are pretty good at Blackhorse. They have just gotten internet connections into each room. That way he can use his laptop rather than the provided computer to get online. In December, February and May he is scheduled to go to a forward operating base that is much more primitive for 30 day rotations. He has managed to call home several times now. He calls on a military line to MacDill and the operator there uses his calling card number to call us here in Winter Haven. Judy & I participate in the family support group at the Bartow armory. We have met some parents and others 'in the same boat' as we are.
